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



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SALERS PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



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
UPDATES FROM THE SALERS OFFICE

It is already mid January 2023 at the time I'm writing this message. After an intense cold spell over Christmas, winter has been pleasant in Alberta with very little snow and mild temperatures.

Salers business is going steady. Memberships are due now. Please send payment to the office. If you are on breedplan, mail updated inventory forms back to the office by March 1st. I will invoice the first part of breedplan by mid March.

CBBC funding towards DNA testing at Neogen is used up. A GGP-100K is now \$45. Remember when sending DNA to the lab, you need to contact the office first to get a DNA application. The DNA application needs to be sent with the DNA to the lab. If there is no application arriving with the DNA, testing will not be done. Turnaround time to get results is approx. 4 weeks. My advise as always is that when you have an animal in the chute, pull DNA, store in a clean paper envelope, clearly labeled, stored in a filing cabinet. You never know when down the road a DNA result is required to define parentage.

COMMERCIAL BREEDER OF YEAR

Scott & Marie White

Dawson Creek, BC by Dianne Finstad

Salers cattle have been a big part of the impressive growth of a first-generation ranch established by the White family in the Peace country.

It's a story of how perseverance, hard work and careful spending can lead to success. The Salers Association of Canada recognized the Whites with the 2022 Commercial Breeders of the Year award.

White Ranch is located in the rolling foothills southwest of Dawson Creek, B.C. Scott and Marie White settled there in 2005, relocating from the Okanagan, where they both grew up.

"We wanted to buy some farmland and start ranching. We looked all over B.C. and this is where we could afford," says Scott White.

They were searching for the right place for two years. But in the end, it happened quickly, in a foreclosure sale. A neighbor from home in the region did a quick check, they decided to go for it, and sent a money draft.

"It was meant to be," says Marie.

"We had three kids under three when we came up here," she adds. "We left behind all our family and friends. We were totally on our own. We knew one person."

The house wasn't much, a 1940's built one bedroom structure. Marie remembers when temperatures dropped below -10C, all the pipes would freeze. But it was home for the next six years.

They brought with them a small cattle herd of 15 pairs. There was no barn, so the young couple had to build or rebuild everything, even reusing old wire on the place.

"We felt like real ranchers when we bought our first roll of new barbed wire!" says Marie.

By that fall, the herd had increased to 35 head.

"We were both working so we just kind of increased numbers as we could afford to," explains Scott.

White was a mechanic at Wolverine Coal Mine in Tumbler Ridge, about an hour away, while Marie





looked after the kids and the cows, and did some odd jobs.

"I guess around the time we had 250 head was when you could say we started ranching fulltime," says Scott, of the 2014 decision. "Something had to give, and we felt that was enough to live off."

Gradually the place took shape, starting with the barn the talented couple built themselves their first summer.

"It was a test run," laughs Marie. "We figured if we could build a barn together, we could build a house." That was the next big project, and although it took a few years, they constructed their own house, including an intricately designed island Marie made for her kitchen. All when they weren't haying or calving, and as they could afford it.

When the Whites were on some of their early land scouting trips, Scott remembers seeing one farm where the owner had a nice herd of Salers cross cattle. He was impressed both with the cows and the size of the calves he saw.

"That stayed with us."

The Whites bought their first Salers bull from Randy Voss, and he was in their herd for more than eight years, one year breeding all fifty of their cows.

"He was a good bull and we've got lots of daughters from him," says Scott.

"Since the beginning, we've been on a program of building up a Salers cross herd. Every cow we have is at least fifty per cent Salers. The majority are red. On the younger end, we've been using some Charolais bulls, for a terminal cross mostly. So we do have some tan cows now."

Most of their Salers bulls have come from the Voss herd, now dispersed; Scattered Spruce Salers or Sky

West Salers.

"All three of those have run larger herds with a commercial side, so we've always liked their cattle, and they always sold us good bulls."

Calving at White Ranch starts the first of February, to avoid the spring mud. The herd now numbers 360 head, operating on just over thirteen of pasture and hay land. A large grazing lease from the provincial Forestry is another important asset. All cows calved out by May go to the lease. The heifers are kept on home pastures to breed separately. Calves are sold after their November weaning, through VJV Dawson

Creek's internet sales. Lately, heifers and lighter calves have been kept back and sold as yearlings. Drought conditions the last few years have meant tight feed supplies. A large bale carryover saved them last year, and they're hoping the 'just enough' feed pile will carry them through this winter.

"They're really, really good mother cows, we've found," says Scott. "They last a long time. They have good feet, good udders, and raise up a good size calf. All of our cows

are quiet. We can tag up the new calves in front of the cows without having to worry."

"Another thing we like about the Salers-cross cows is they're very easy calvers. When we buy Charolais bulls for the terminal cross, we've bought bulls with up to a 120 pound birthweight, and we don't have any real problems at calving."

"They try and jump out about five times, and are usually standing up in the sled when they're two minutes old!"

While the cattle herd expanded, so did the White family. There are seven children ranging in age from two to twenty-one. The two oldest are out of the house now, with their son married and expecting, and starting his own ranch down the road. Those still at home are a big part of the operation, each with their own cows, as part of their wages.

"We couldn't do it without the kids," points out Ma-

"Our goal is now that we've got the cow herd to where it needs to be, we'd like to get the ranch to where we want it to be," says Scott. "We need more

dugouts, and fields worked up, and more fencing. There's always something to improve on." The remarkable progress on the White Ranch in less than two decades came despite a challenging start - BSE hit just a week after they'd taken out their first cattle loan.

"It took a while to pay that loan back," Scott remembers. "But that kind of stuck with us. We try to run as cheap as we possibly can. It's really the only way to be profitable."

"That's been the secret to this business," he says. "We started small and worked our way into it. Let the cows pay for themselves and pay for the expansion."

To be honored with the Salers Commercial Breeder award came as quite a shock to the Whites.

"It's an honor, and we really appreciate it," says Scott. "We take pride in the herd we've built up over the years and it's nice to see that someone else recognized that."

"We're excited and honored to get the award. It's been lots of work," comments Marie.

"It was Scott's dream to be a rancher, and mine to be a rancher's wife."

Stephen Parrish, Rockland, NS

"Salers do take the workload out of it when it comes to calving."

Stephen Parrish can carry on his family's long-standing tradition of raising cattle in the Maritimes, because he's focused on the Salers breed.

"You can trust them to calve on their own." says Parrish, who is the sixth generation of Parrish's on their farm in Rockland, Nova Scotia. t's an important advantage in his region, where it's not easy to be a full-time cattle producer. Parrish has worked for thirty-seven years as a survey technician for a local land survey company, along with maintaining his Salers herd.

Stephen Parrish is assisted by his brother David and nephew Joel on the farm, calving out about 35 registered purebreds annually.

"We all work off the farm, so the cattle have to take care of themselves," explains Parrish. recognize enthusiastic commitment to the breed for nearly four decades, the Canadian Salers Association honored Parrish Salers Farm as the Purebred Breeder of the Year for 2022.

"We were having a lot of trouble calving with other breeds, and calves that wouldn't get up and nurse. We did some research on different breeds, and came across Salers, and talked to people about them. They were supposed to be one of the best."

The farm's introduction to Sal-

ers came around the same time as Parrish began his off-farm job.

"We bought our first five females from Alberta to get into the purebreds," recalls Parrish. "They arrived in the fall of 1986."

It didn't hurt that Myles Morrell from New Brunswick, who'd been in Salers for quite a while, told them it was the breed they needed.

"So we went in full force, I guess," chuckles Parrish. The first stock came from the late Gerald Dixon, who



put plenty of Salers into the Maritimes. Over the years Parrish Farms added twelve females and six bulls from a variety of breeders.

It was Stephen who convinced his father Harold to move into purebreds, a move they never regretted. "In the early years, we crossbred them, because we had a whole herd of other breeds. Eventually we weaned them out and kept the Salers."

While Parrish Farm did sell bulls initially, as the

number of cattle farms in the region dwindled, there was more demand for females.

"We were the first farm to sell purebred Salers females to Newfoundland in 1991."

That same year, Parrish was one of five Maritime Salers breeders to partner on purchasing the bull Discovery, the Reserve Junior Champion at

the National Western Stock Show in Denver. It was a gamble that paid off, with the bull used in pastures throughout the Maritimes, and semen sold right across Canada.

"His females really milked."

Parrish's breeding program sees him bringing in a new bull every four years, as well as supplementing with AI on the heifers.

"When I go looking for bull, it's usually #1, some-





what he gained, what he came off the cow at, so I know there's milk there. I'm looking for thickness and disposition."

Add in a moderate frame, good feet and legs, and polled genetics, and you've got the shopping list Parrish uses when he picks up the phone to go bull shopping.

"It's cheaper than an airline ticket! I've never been disappointed."

"We find, with selecting good bulls - you put more money into a good bull - you get better females that you keep yourself."

Those females have staying power, with many producing fifteen calves or more. One even gave them a calf at 19!

"I'm proud of all of them! They're a good bunch of females."

Calving can start as early as December, but weaning always happens on Thanksgiving weekend. The top ten per cent of the females are selected to go back into the herd. The remainder go to a loyal feeder buyer who's come for nearly thirty years to pick them up on weaning day. He backgrounds the calves before sending them on to a PEI feedlot for finishing.

The farm has hay and pasture on 200 acres, which is silage and grazed.

"There's lots of rain in Nova Scotia, so silage is the way to go. You can do it in a hurry. It seems it's getting tougher to see a week of hot, sunny weather for dry hay."

When the weather turns snowy and damp, the cattle head indoors to the barn, where they're bedded weekly with sawdust. They're fed the silage, with some supplemental 'short feed' for the younger stock.

Parrish Farm is set part way up the south mountain of the Annapolis Valley, on rocky land good for grazing cattle. With plenty of nearby poultry operations, Parrish's use chicken and turkey manure along with their own winter bedding to fertilize the fields.

Stephen Parrish serves as secretary-treasurer for the Maritime Salers Association. He's honored to be named Purebred Breeder of the Year, but it's bittersweet after the sudden passing this winter of his good friend, Brian Walker, of New Brunswick.

"That was a major shock to everybody. He's the reason I got this award, as he's the one who nominated me. He was a major player in the region, and is going to be missed."

"I told one guy who knows our family quite well (about the award), and he said 'My father would be very proud' and he probably would be."

"So I'm pretty proud to get it."

The best part is the cattle continue to deliver for Parrish Salers Farm.

"If I've got a cow calving, I can put her in the calving pen and go in and watch the news," Parrish says with delight. "When I come out there'll be a calf there, and it's probably getting up to suck," he chuckles.

"The best thing we did was get into Salers."

SALERS 2022

Stephen Parrish, Rockland, NS

Les animaux Salers allègent la charge de travail en ce qui concerne le vêlage.

C'est grâce à la race Salers que Stephen Parrish peut poursuivre la longue tradition familiale d'élevage de bétail dans les Maritimes.

« Vous pouvez leur faire confiance pour vêler par elles-mêmes », déclare Stephen, qui est la sixième génération de Parrish sur leur ferme à Rockland, en Nouvelle-Écosse.

C'est un avantage important dans sa région, où il n'est pas facile d'être éleveur de bovins à temps plein. Stephen travaille depuis trente-sept ans comme technicien d'arpentage pour une entreprise locale d'arpentage, tout en entretenant son troupeau de Salers.

Stephen Parrish est assisté de son frère David et de

son neveu Joel à la ferme, vêlant environ 35 femelles pur-sang enregistrées chaque année.

« Nous travaillons tous à l'extérieur de la ferme, donc le bétail doit prendre soin d'eux-mêmes », explique-t-il.

Pour reconnaître l'engagement enthousiaste envers la race pendant près de quatre décennies, l'Association canadienne Salers a honoré Parrish Salers Farm en tant qu'éleveur pur-sang pour l'année 2022.

L'introduction de la race Salers à leur ferme est survenue à peu près au même moment où Stephen a commencé son travail hors ferme.

« Nous avons acheté nos cinq premières femelles de l'Alberta pour débuter notre élevage pur-sang », se souvient Stephen. "Elles sont arrivées à l'automne 1986."

De plus que Myles Morrell du Nouveau-Brunswick,

qui était impliqué avec la Salers depuis un bon moment, leur ait dit que c'était la race qui repondérait à leurs besoins.

Nous nous sommes donc lancés à plein, je suppose », rit Stephen.

Le premier stock est parvenu de Gerald Dixon (maintenant décédé), qui a vendu plusieurs animaux Salers aux producteurs des Maritimes. Au fil des ans, Parrish Farms a ajouté douze femelles et six taureaux provenant de divers éleveurs.

C'est Stephen qui a convaincu son père Harold de passer au pur-sang, une décision qu'ils n'ont jamais regrettée.

« Au cours des premières années, on les croisait, parce que notre troupeau consistait de plusieurs autres génétiques. Finalement, nous avons sélectionné et au fur et à mesure, nous avons gardé que les Salers.

Alors que Parrish Farm vendait des taureaux au départ, à mesure que le nombre de fermes bovines

> dans la région diminuait, seule la demande pour les femelles resta stable.

> « Nous avons été la première ferme à vendre des femelles Salers pursang à Terre-Neuve en 1991.»

> Cette même année, la famille Parrish était l'un des cinq éleveurs de Salers des Maritimes à s'associer pour l'achat du taureau Dis-

covery, le champion junior de réserve au National Western Stock Show à Denver. C'est un risque qui a réussi puisque le taureau a été utilisé dans plusieurs pâturages des Maritimes et que la semence a été vendue partout au Canada.

"Ses filles ont beaucoup de lait."

Le système d'élevage des Parrish prévoit l'achat d'un nouveau taureau à tous les quatre ans, ainsi qu'un programme d'insémination pour les génisses.

"Nous avions beaucoup de mal

à vêler avec d'autres races, et

les veaux ne se levaient pas et

n'allaitaient pas tout seul. Nous

avons effectué des recherches

sur différentes races et nous

sommes tombés sur la Salers.

Ces animaux étaient censés être

parmi les meilleurs."



"Quand je cherche un taureau, mon premier point de sélection est une généalogie qui est différente de celle que j'ai déjà. Ensuite, je regarde les chiffres de performance – son gain, son poids au sevrage pour me rassurer qu'il vienne d'une lignée avec du lait. Je recherche aussi de l'épaisseur et un tempérament doux.

Ajoutez à cela une grandeur modérée, de bons pieds et de bonnes pattes ainsi qu'une génétique sans cornes, et vous avez la liste des critères essentiels. de Stephen Parrish utilise lorsqu'il décroche le téléphone pour faire du shopping.

« C'est moins cher qu'un billet d'avion ! Je n'ai jamais été déçu. »

"Nous constatons qu'en sélectionnant de bons taureaux – vous-y mettez plus d'argent, mais vous obtenez de meilleures femelles qui restent dans le troupeau longtemps."

Ces femelles ont de la longévité, plusieurs produisant quinze veaux ou plus. Une d'elles leur a même donné un veau à 19 ans!

« Je suis fier de notre troupeau! C'est un bon groupe de femelles. »

Les vêlages commencent dès décembre, mais le sevrage a toujours lieu la fin de semaine de l'Action de Grace. Les top dix pour cent des meilleures femelles sont sélectionnées pour la relève du troupeau. Le reste est acheté par un engraisseur fidèle, qui vient chez eux depuis près de trente ans, les récupérer le jour du sevrage. Il conditionne les veaux avant de les envoyer dans un parc de finition à l'Î.-P.-É.

La ferme produit du foin et des pâturages sur 200 acres, qui sont ensilés et pâturés.

« Il pleut souvent en Nouvelle-Écosse, alors l'ensilage est la voie à suivre. Vous pouvez le faire rapidement. Il semble que cela devient de plus en plus difficile de voir une semaine de temps chaud et ensoleillé pour du foin sec.



Lorsque le temps devient neigeux et humide, le bétail est gardé à l'intérieur de la grange, où à chaque semaine, la litière de sciure de bois est rafraichie. Ils sont nourris avec de l'ensilage, et les jeunes animaux sont supplémentés.

Parrish Farm est situé à mi-chemin sur la montagne sud de la vallée d'Annapolis, sur un terrain rocheux propice au pâturage du bétail. Avec de nombreuses exploitations avicoles à proximité, la ferme utilise du fumier de poulet et de dinde ainsi que sa propre litière d'hiver pour fertiliser les champs.

Stephen Parrish est secrétaire-trésorier de l'Association Salers des Maritimes. Il est honoré d'être nommé Éleveur de l'année, mais c'est doux-amer après le décès soudain cet hiver de son bon ami, Brian Walker, du Nouveau-Brunswick.

"Cela a été un choc majeur pour tout le monde. Il est la raison pour laquelle j'ai obtenu ce prix, car c'est lui qui m'a nominé. Il était un leader majeur dans la région et il va nous manquer.

"J'ai partagé ma nouvelle avec un ami de la famille (à propos du prix de l'éleveur de l'année), et il a dit" Ton père serait très fier" et je n'en doute pas.

"Je suis donc très fier de le recevoir."

La meilleure partie est que le bétail continue de bien travailler pour Parrish Salers Farm.

« Si j'ai une vache qui vêle, je peux la mettre dans l'enclos de vêlage et retourner à la maison pour regarder les nouvelles », dit Stephen avec plaisir. "A mon retour à la grange, il y aura un veau, qui sera en train de se lever probablement pour essayer de téter", dit-il en souriant.

Notre meilleure décision fut de changer pour la race Salers. »

She continues to influence the Salers breed with herd bulls such as OPP Saber 847U, OPP West Star 938W, OPP Eliminator 038X, ECR Hercules 036H and outstanding daughters.

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



Genotyping in Times of Change

Quite often in the early winter as both seedstock and commercial producers, the calves have been sold and we are focused on the successful calving of the next crop of progeny. But we can't forget about the females that were held back to be the next producers for the future. So how do you ensure/know that you selected and retained the best prospects? Gone are the days of using just what you see or the phenotypes of the animal or selecting solely based on the parents or pedigree. We can use a combination of phenotype, pedigree and genomics to take the questions out of the decision and ensure that your herd goals are being progressed towards the future starting with who you are choosing to keep and breed. With a changing market and contracting industry, it is more crucial than ever to ensure technologies are being utilized. So how can we use genomic testing to not only help mitigate market changes but capitalize on them? Neogen Canada has products for both the seedstock and commercial producers to help ride the tides of a changing marketplace. For seedstock producers, genotyping tests are available to help select the most desired traits in your breeding stock at an early age of the animal. Parentage testing verifies sire performance and guarantees accurate pedigree reporting. Commercial producers also can run genomic profiles on their animals to help make herd decisions.

The DNA testing that is available to seedstock producers determines the genotype of each animal and provides the genomically enhanced expected progeny differences (gEPDs). The difference of gEDPs over traditional expected progeny differences (EDPs) is accuracy. An animals gEPDs will have a higher rate of accuracy over traditional EPDs This is because gEPDs factor each animals' genetic potential into their evaluation. gEPDs give insight an animal's heritable traits before the animal has even had a single offspring, potentially saving a breeder time and money by only making breeding decisions based on desired traits ensuring herd/breed improvement. The tests that will generate gEPDs are the GGP-30k and the GGP-100k. Both the GGP-30k and 100k include parentage verification to verify the predicted sire is the true sire. This allows for accurate recorded pedigrees. The difference between the 30k and 100k tests, simply put is the density. The GGP-30k test analyzes 30,000 markers while the GGP-100k analyzes 100,000. The GGP-100k is a higher density panel, therefore this test is used on highly prolific animals (i.e., AI sires, ET dams, and prolific herd sires) that contribute a great deal of genetic material to the entire herd through their many offspring. The GGP-100k test allows different genetic conditions such as coat colour or horn/polled testing to be ran because of the higher that is applied to the assay. Other genetic conditions can be tested when the 100k test is ran.

If you are a commercial producer, you also have options to use genomic testing in your commercial herd. The Igenity® Beef Profile is a genomic profile tool to use on either cross bred or straight bred cattle. With 17 traits and three indexes plus parentage, this DNA profile helps you make more confident decisions. Using the Igenity® Beef Profile much like gEPDs you can identity animals that have the most heritable traits in your herd for future generations. The Igenity® Beef Profile evaluates 17 different traits and generates a 1-10 score on each trait to help you sort and rank cattle, see patterns, strengths, weaknesses, areas of improvement and create custom indexes to meet your goals. This 1-10 number is based on beef cattle records and genetics in the International Genetic Solutions (IGS) database. IGS is the genomic evaluation provider for most North American beef breeds thus providing you with the most accurate and relevant data in relation to your animals in your operation. The following traits are evaluated in the profile; birth weight, calving ease direct, calving ease maternal, stayability, heifer pregnancy, docility, milk, residual feed intake, average daily gain, weaning weight, yearling weight, scrotal circumference, tenderness, marbling, ribeye area, fat thickness, and hot carcass weight. An example of how using the Igenity® indexes to increase your return on investment is selecting replacement with the goal of raising weaning weight average score by one Igenity point on 250 cows boosts calf production by 1,750 pounds per year. That can equate to a thicker bottom line for a commercial producer.

A very important aspect of genetic testing to understand and embrace is that gEPDs/EPDs and Igenity® beef are powerful tools to make genetic change in herds. They are an objective indicator of the heritable genetic merit of the animal which is how we can use them to make breeding and breed improvement decisions. They are also a marketing tool available to producers. Whether the goal is marketing carcass traits for selling your farm to table product or promoting low birth weight bulls, genomic testing is an investment that can help improve your herd as well as your bottom line. Knowing the depth of your herds genetics and what you are building can help to mitigate any market uncertainties or changes. Always keep in mind that DNA testing is not the be all end all and should be used in combination with other selection practices such as conformation, soundness and management practices. Using and marketing gEPD's will be the best investment to generate not only the most income back to your herd but the longevity of the breed and industry.
